Purpose of the Report	To seek Health Board approval for the provision of a Mobile/Visiting PET/CT Service for use by the Nuclear Medicine Department – Singleton Hospital, for a 12-month period, commencing 1st December 2021.			
Key Issues	The Mobile PET/CT Service is a clinically critical function and the Welsh Health Specialised Service Committee (WHSSC) has commissioned the Health Board to provide this service for patients, until such time as the permanent static solution is introduced on-site. This is a refresh of the current arrangements in-situ with Alliance Medical Ltd (AML), which was initially awarded on a 1-year contract, with flexibility to extend into a 2 nd and 3 rd year (1+1+1 basis). However, because there have been some issues regarding the resilience of the service and reservations about its continuation, it was deemed appropriate to re-test the market, rather than simply extend the existing arrangements.

PROVISION OF A MOBILE PET CT SERVICE – SINGLETON HOSITAL NUCLEAR MEDICINE

1. INTRODUCTION

To provide a Mobile/Visiting PET CT Service, which is to be funded by WHSSC.

2. BACKGROUND

The All Wales Programme Business Case for PET services was endorsed by Welsh Government Ministers last month. Swansea Bay UHB will be the site for one of the new permanent scanners and work is now commencing on our local business case. In the meantime Swansea Bay UHB has a requirement to refresh the current arrangements for the provision of Mobile/Visiting PET/CT service, operating under the Nuclear Medicine Dept at Singleton hospital. There are issues with the current service provision from Alliance Medical Ltd and following a further competition exercise, the Health Board are now seeking to award a short term, 12-month agreement to InHealth (INH).

3. GOVERNANCE AND RISK ISSUES

A Framework exists with NHS Supply Chain (NHSSC) which enables authorities to utilise the "mini-competition" process. Therefore, this framework was used to invite suppliers to provide proposals for the provision of a mobile/visiting PET/CT Service.

NHSSC issued the Specification documents on the 20th August 2021 advising the framework suppliers to submit their technical response by Noon on the 3rd September 2021. Whilst five suppliers were invited, only Alliance Medical (the incumbent) and InHealth submitted bids for consideration

4. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The service provision of a mobile unit has received funding support from WHSSC. WHSSC have commissioned the Health Board on a cost per case basis for an annual activity of 1,200 cases at an average cost of £1,000 per case.

In the 13-month period since the service commenced in July 2020, 1,205 cases have been seen.

The funding from WHSSC covers the hire costs of the mobile unit but also covers internal costs to the Health Board for delivering the service e.g. consultant reporting of the scans, administration/booking and overheads etc.

5. RECOMMENDATION

The technical submission was evaluated by the Project Team, which consisted of clinical colleagues from Nuclear Medicine and Andrew Ward, Senior Diagnostic Imaging Advisor, Specialist Estates Services.

To deliver the commissioned volume of activity the Health Board would need to see 12 patients per day, twice weekly. The financial analysis indicates that at this level of activity the InHealth bid would be slightly more cost effective.

The analysis of the responses from both a technical and financial perspective has determined that the contract should be awarded to InHealth. The InHealth system proposed provides greater flexibility, as the system is around 50% faster and patients will not spend so much time in a fixed position. The cost effectiveness of the InHealth bid would be increased if further capacity was to be commissioned. The demand requirements will be discussed with WHSSC, however the service will be maintained within existing commissioned levels until additional activity is commissioned.

It was concluded that the system offers value for money, as an interim solution that best meets the Health Board's immediate requirements. The proposed offer from InHealth, is more competitive than the current pricing with Alliance Medical Ltd.

It is therefore recommended that the contract be awarded to InHealth accordingly.
